



Amy Loogatha Rayarriwarrtharrbayingat - Biography

"I remember getting a message that Aunty Sally Gabori was coming over to Bentinck to show us something. She brought one of her paintngs and gave it to Ethel. It was beautiful. So we decided that we would follow Sally and paint too. I got a shock when I went to the Art Centre and saw all my sisters and Aunties painting. Now I paint with them.

I was born behind Nyinyilki on Bentinck Island. I remember when I was small and planes used to fly overhead we used to run and hide in the mangroves. It was fun playing and growing up on Bentinck as small girls but that soon changed when they came and took us away and dumped us on Mornington Island on 1946.

Life was very hard in the dormitory. We were fed flour with weavels in it, we had to bathe in saltwater and our clothes were made out of rough material like the canvas we now paint on. I went out to the mainland to work for a few years on stations before coming back to Mornington and having children.

When our landrights came, it was great to be free of Mornington Is. and return to our home. I took my grandchildren with me to show them their traditional country and to live on our homeland once again."










Thancoupie Moon and Star The Lovers Bronze 2010

Thancoupie's sculptural garden.

The story of MOON and STAR- the LOVERS.

When they were people, Indhyk, the moon, and Wini'henh, the star, were in love and lived on the earth in a humpy by the sea. They camped with the other people in the tribes along the coast of Noomboun, or Pera Head. lyndhik would travel around the skies and come back to his lover at night to rest.

One day Indhyk told Wini'henh he had to leave and travel the sky above. He had work to do controlling the tides. Winihenh stayed in the humpy and grew sadder each day. So she decided she would follow him. Today we can still see them travelling across the sky - the bright moon in front and the star a short distance behind, going right across the sky together, every night.



The art work depicts the star and moon as they travel across the seas, and the sun setting on the horizon for the lovers. In the water two of the signs for the seasons and tides are represented -Beaug, the crab, who comes out in low tide, and the two Pisces, the fish, who like to swim in for high tide. Ivndhik the moon controls the tides and seasons.

RESPECT Our Elders and their Memory

Thancoupie Gloria Fletcher AO was made a Queensland Great. She was founding co Patron of CIAF until her death in 2011. She spoke the Thaynakwith language and was the first Aboriginal woman to do many things - first to become a potter, to have a solo exhibition overseas, to own her own house in Cairns, to graduate from Art College, to be an Australian Cultural commissioner overseas. Thancoupie met the Queen, had many exhibitions and her ceramics were collected by major Art Galleries. Thancoupie loved children and they loved her. Over four decades she taught hundreds about the legends, culture and language of Cape York.

Arone Meeks

Meeks' work *Impact*, talks of Captain Cook hitting the reef and how they used a technique called Fobbing.

Fobbing is when the sail is tied to the edge of the boat and a sailor swims under the boat and brings the sail up the other side. This pressures the fabric, sealing the hole caused by the boat hitting the coral reef.


The V shape reflects the shape of the boat. You can see the coral inside the boat, the Quinkin figure, the dillybag, new life and the bird called Arone, the crane.

The V shape of the Boat is also sitting on a fertility/Earth design as a metaphor for when the Endeavour had to be beached for repairs.

Consider the mix of contemporary and traditional motifs, themes and symbology. How does this reflect Meeks' life?

Contemporary Indigenous Art is the art of today, produced by Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander artists living in a range of urban and remote communities.

Contemporary Indigenous Artists work in a globally influenced, culturally diverse, and technologically advancing world. Their art is a dynamic combination of materials, methods, concepts and subjects that often challenge traditional boundaries of both Western and Indigenous art and defy easy definition. Diverse and eclectic, contemporary Indigenous Art as a whole is distinguished by the very lack of a uniform, organising principle, ideology or style.

In the Cairns Cruise Liner Terminal are a number of art centres from different communities. Find 1 art centre whose work you find interesting.

The Indigenous art centres are entities owned and governed by the communities in which they play significant roles. Art centres provide places for the ethical production of authentic Indigenous artwork created by community based artists, and give emerging artists opportunities for professional development, training and education. They are places where artists and their families are able to gather safely and work. They are places where young people can access positive role models. The intended function of the art centre in a community is one of maintaining and strengthening Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander cultures and identity.
